### Meeting the Needs of Childhood Victims of Sex Trafficking

The FFPSA includes in its exception to the two-week federal payments rule congregate care settings that provide specialized services for childhood victims of sex trafficking. In this session we will explore the particular needs of children who have been trafficked or are potential targets of sex trafficking. The discussion will focus on risk factors and best practices in terms of language, assessment, treatment approaches, and outcomes. Participants will leave with an understanding of how to establish programs and utilize community supports to promote recovery for this vulnerable population.

# The Future of Care: Surrounding Families with Supports and Services

New York State plans FFPSA compliance by 2021. The NYS Coalition's for Children's Behavioral Health has undertaken an effort to identify the services and methods providers can employ to increase a child's chances of remaining in home or other community-based settings. The Coalition identified which services are valued most by parents, caregivers and kin. NY expanded their Medicaid State Plan and added entitlement services, like care coordination and Child and Family Treatment and Support Services (CFTSS) that pull former waiver services into available entitlement options.
