President Biden's Budget for FY24

On March 9th, President Biden unveiled his FY 2024 Budget blueprint for Congress. NACBH Proposals to Senate Finance Committee on Improving Access to Residential Behavioral Health Treatment

NACBH has <u>submitted policy recommendations</u> to the Senate Finance Committee in response to five mental health bills drafted by the committee last fall. The five Senate Finance Committee draft bills covered a variety of issues related to mental health coverage under Medicare, Medicaid,

NACBH Memo to Member Organizations on Results of December Omnibus

NACBH has created a memo summarizing the most impactful provisions to children's behavioral health passed in the December Omnibus. This legislative package was significant in size and effect: extending telehealth flexibilities, covering LMFTs and intensive outpatient programs under Medicare, and providing funds and technical assistance to school-based mental health services. NACBH has also submitted policy recommendations to the Senate HELP Committee in response to Chairman Bernie Sanders and Ranking Member Bill Cassidy's Request for Input issued in February. Our response covered the significant administrative and regulatory burdens that limit care, low reimbursement rates by payors, and the impact of these drivers on national workforce shortages, particularly in children's behavioral health. Senate HELP Hearing: Community Health Centers: Saving Lives, Saving Money

On Thursday, March 2nd, The Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions held a full

committee hearing titled <u>"Community Health Centers:</u>
<u>Saving Lives, Saving Money."</u> The hearing was held to evaluate the value of community health centers – both in terms of saving lives and saving money. In addition, the committee must reauthorize the Community Health Center Fund by September 30th. The hearing aimed to understand the needs of community health centers as the committee enters the reauthorization process.

CMS Prior Authorization Proposed Rule

The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has proposed a rule to address the administrative difficulties of prior authorization, meet shorter decision-making time frames, and improve transparency. The rule proposes that all impacted payers implement and maintain a FHIR Prior Authorization Requirements Documentation, and Decision API (PARDD API). Ideally, the API would streamline the prior authorization process by automating the process to determine whether a prior authorization is required for an item or service, thereby eliminating one of the major pain points of the existing prior authorization process. Medicaid "Unwinding" Information & Resources

The Biden Administration has announced that it will end the COVID-19 national emergency and public health emergency declarations on May 11th. As these emergency declarations expire, many expanded Medicaid enrollment protections and increases in federal funding will expire or change. Notably, since March 2020, in order to receive additional federal matching dollars, states have not been allowed to disenroll people from Medicaid. However, beginning on April 1st, states may begin to "unwind" this coverage protection and disenroll families and children who no longer qualify. Keep Reading



Office of Civil Rights Guidance on Online Tracking Technologies under HIPPA

The Office of Civil Rights (OCR) at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) recently issued a Bulletin on the disclosure of Protected Health Information (PHI) by HIPAA-regulated entities in an online environment increasingly proliferated by tracking technologies. The Bulletin clarifies that regulated entities are not permitted to use tracking technologies/vendors in a manner that would result in impermissible disclosures of PHI or any other violations of HIPAA rules. DEA Announces Proposed Rules for Permanent Telemedicine Flexibilities

The Drug Enforcement Administration announced proposed permanent rules for the prescribing of controlled medications via telemedicine, expanding patient access to critical therapies beyond the scheduled end of the COVID-19 public health emergency. The proposed rules aim to extend many of the flexibilities adopted during the public health emergency with appropriate safeguards. Learn More
