PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

Congress: Major Funding Actions



Status and next steps on key funding issues:

<u>Public Works Infrastructure bill</u>: Earlier this week, President Biden signed into law the \$1 trillion <u>Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act</u>, completing

action on the largest federal investment in decades to improve roads, bridges, rail, broadband, the electrical grid, and other physical infrastructure projects. After passing the Senate in August, the bill was caught up in larger negotiations in the House for several months, ultimately gaining the approval of 13 Republicans and all but 6 Democrats to get it across the finish line. Attention now turns to the Build Back Better bill.

<u>Human Infrastructure bill</u>: As of this writing on Thursday afternoon, the Congressional Budget Office is expected to send final cost estimates for the <u>Build</u> <u>Back Better</u> reconciliation package to the House by close of business today, clearing the way for a House vote before the Thanksgiving break. The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has been releasing estimates on the cost of various sections of the bill since last week and is expected to issue the remaining scores by close of business on Friday. The House may or may not delay the vote until the full score is released, but the intention is to get the bill to the Senate before next week. <u>Continue Reading</u>

COVID-19: CMS Issues Interim Final Rule Requiring Health Facility Staff Vaccinations

On November 5, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) published an <u>interim final rule</u> (IFR) requiring that essentially all staff of Medicareor Medicaid-certified provider facilities receive the COVID-19 vaccine. Relevant to NACBH, this includes Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facilities (PRTFs), psychiatric hospitals, and intermediate care facilities for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities (ICF/IDD). Twelve additional provider and supplier types are specified in the IFR. The regulations create a consistent standard within Medicare and Medicaid and apply to approximately 76,000 providers employing more than 17 million health care workers across the country.

Facilities covered by the IFR must establish a policy ensuring that all eligible staff have received the first dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine or a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine prior to providing any care, treatment, or other services by December 5, 2021. All eligible staff must have received the necessary shots to be fully vaccinated by January 4, 2022. The regulations provide for exemptions based on recognized medical conditions or religious beliefs, observances, or practices, which facilities must develop specific policies and procedures to accommodate.

A detailed <u>FAQ document</u> covers the basic requirements, covered entities, applicable staff, exemptions, enforcement, alignment with the OSHA emergency temporary standards (ETS), and interaction with state law.

Public comments on the IFR are due no later than 5:00 p.m. Eastern on January 4, 2022.

COVID-19: OSHA Issues Interim Final Rule Requiring Large Employer Vaccinations or Testing



Also on November 5, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) issued an <u>IFR</u> implementing an Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) requiring proof of vaccination or weekly testing of staff at organizations with more than 100 employees. As earlier <u>reported</u> in connection with a separate COVID ETS,

these standards are, by design, temporary. They serve as a proposal for a permanent standard to be finalized within six months after publication of the ETS. Public comments on all aspects of this ETS, including whether it should become a final rule at the six-month point, are due by December 6, 2021.

In the interim, more than a dozen lawsuits to bar implementation of the ETS are pending in six federal appeals courts. A three-judge panel of the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals granted a temporary stay prohibiting enforcement for now. OSHA is expected to seek consolidation of all of the lawsuits, which would then be assigned to one circuit at random and likely to proceed to the Supreme Court whichever way that circuit decides. Covered employers may wish to begin planning to comply in the event that the mandates are not struck down.

COVID-19 and Children



Following FDA approval of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine for children 5 to 11 years old and the <u>CDC's related</u> <u>recommendation</u>, about 900,000 young children received the vaccination in the first week it was available and an additional 700,000 appointments had been scheduled. About 28 million children are covered by the recommendation, with as many as a third

estimated to be enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP.

Recent <u>CMS guidance</u> reiterates the American Rescue Plan's requirement that Medicaid and CHIP plans cover vaccinations and COVID-related treatments without cost-sharing. The National Academy for State Health Policy (NASHP) has posted a <u>blog</u> outlining challenges for pediatric providers and highlighting strategies for increasing vaccine uptake among children and their parents. <u>Continue Reading</u>

Follow-up: CMS Guidance on Waiving the IMD Exclusion for QRTPs

As earlier <u>reported</u>, on October 19 CMS updated <u>guidance</u> on Medicaid coverage of children in Qualified Residential Treatment Programs (<u>QRTPs</u>) under Section 1115 waivers. It allows states to request a delay of up to two years in the <u>previously announced</u> length of stay limitations in QRTPs that meet the definition of excluded Institutions for Mental Diseases (<u>IMDs</u>), as long as certain conditions are met.

One of the conditions that states must meet for CMS approval is for their QRTPs to comply with federal regulations for Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facilities (PRTFs). We inquired with CMS about whether QRTPs would need to meet all federal PRTF requirements and received this response:

Providers with outstanding reporting requirements should visit the <u>PRF Reporting</u> <u>Portal</u> and submit their report on use of funds by Tuesday, November 30 at 11:59 p.m. Eastern. Providers who do not submit a completed report by the end of the 60-day grace period for PRF Reporting Period 1 may be subject to enforcement actions such as repayment or other debt collection activities.
